#### **PISTOL PERMIT PROCESS**

Applicants (21 years of age and older) are to complete and provide the following documents which are required to start the pistol permit process. This includes:

- Notarized Pistol Permit Application DPS-799-C, revised 7/16/2024 (attached)
- FBI Privacy Act Form (attached)
- Noncriminal Justice Applicant's Privacy Rights Form (attached)
- Agency Privacy Requirements for Noncriminal Justice Applicants Form (attached)
- Certified Copy, with raised seal, Birth Certificate must be included
- Certificate from a Pistol Safety Course that has been approved by the State
  of Connecticut Special Licensing and Firearms Unit. Effective 7/1/2024, no
  certificate that was issued over 2 years from the date that you submit your
  application will be accepted. (CT Public Act 23-53)
- Most recent passport photograph of applicant must be included
- One money order, personal check, or certified check made payable to: Ansonia Police Department for \$70.00 for the Ansonia Police Department Processing Fee
- Self-Addressed stamped envelope

The applicant must then submit all of the above paperwork to the Ansonia Police Department.

The dispatcher on duty will then provide a **Pistol Permit Service Code** to the applicant to complete the next step on https://ct.flexcheck.us.idemia.io/cchrspreenroll.

Upon completion and payment of state fee, an APPLICANT TRACKING NUMBER will be generated which you will need to print out along with the PRE-ENROLLMENT CONFIRMATION in order to be fingerprinted.

After all of these steps are complete, the applicant will then schedule an appointment to be fingerprinted by calling 203-735-1885. Note: Ansonia residents can only be fingerprinted at the Ansonia Police Department for Ansonia Pistol Permits. No fingerprints will be accepted from another police department.

If the Pre-Enrollment process is not completed and both pieces of paperwork are not provided to a police officer at the time of fingerprinting, you will be turned away from being fingerprinted until this part of the process is complete.

The application process takes approximately 6-8 weeks from the time that the fingerprints are submitted, which completes the application. We will contact you by phone or mail when your 60-day temporary permit has been approved. If your application is denied, notification in writing will be mailed to the address on your application.

The licensing statute also contains a "suitability clause" which provides that the issuing authority may deny such application, if it determines that the applicant is not a suitable person to possess or carry a pistol or revolver. The suitability clause applies to both the issuance or new permits and revocation of existing permits.

Any denial of a pistol permit may be appealed to the Board of Firearm Permit Examiners at 165 Capitol Ave, Suite 1070, Hartford, CT 06106, in writing, within ninety (90) days in order to begin the appeal process.

#### Noncriminal Justice Applicant's Privacy Rights

As an applicant who is the subject of a national fingerprint-based criminal history record check for a noncriminal justice purpose (such as an application for employment or a license, an immigration or naturalization matter, security clearance, or adoption), you have certain rights which are discussed below. <u>All notices must be provided to you in writing.</u> These obligations are pursuant to the Privacy Act of 1974, Title 5, United States Code (U.S.C.) Section 552a, and Title 28 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR), 50.12, among other authorities.

- You must be provided an adequate written FBI Privacy Act Statement (dated 2013 or later), by the agency that
  will receive your criminal history results, when you submit your fingerprints and associated personal
  information. This Privacy Act Statement must explain the authority for collecting your fingerprints and
  associated information and whether your fingerprints and associated information will be searched, shared, or
  retained.<sup>2</sup>
- You must be advised in writing of the procedures for obtaining a change, correction, or update of your FBI criminal history record as set forth at 28 CFR 16.34.
- You must be provided the opportunity to complete or challenge the accuracy of the information in your FBI criminal history record (if you have such a record).
- If you have a criminal history record, you should be afforded a reasonable amount of time to correct or complete the record (or decline to do so) before the officials deny you the employment, license, or other benefit based on information in the FBI criminal history record.

#### **Agency Privacy Requirements for Noncriminal Justice Applicants**

Authorized governmental and non-governmental agencies/officials that conduct a national fingerprint-based criminal history record check on an applicant for a noncriminal justice purpose (such as employment or a license, immigration or naturalization matter, security clearance, or adoption) are obligated to ensure the applicant is provided certain notices and that the results of the check are handled in a manner that protects the applicant's privacy. All notices must be provided in writing. These obligations are pursuant to the Privacy Act of 1974, Title 5, United States Code (U.S.C.), Section 552a, and Title 28, Code of Federal Regulations (CFR), Section 50.12, among other authorities.

- Officials must ensure that each applicant receives an adequate written FBI Privacy Act Statement (dated 2013 or later) when the applicant submits his/her fingerprints and associated personal information.<sup>2</sup>
- Officials must advise all applicants in writing that procedures for obtaining a change, correction, or
  update of an FBI criminal history record are set forth at 28 CFR 16.34. Information regarding this
  process may be found at <a href="https://www.fbi.gov/services/cjis/identity-history-summary-checks">https://www.edo.cjis.gov</a>.
- Officials must provide the applicant the opportunity to complete or challenge the accuracy of the information in the FBI criminal history record.
- Officials should not deny the employment, license, or other benefit based on information in the FBI
  criminal history record until the applicant has been afforded a reasonable time to correct or complete the
  record or has declined to do so.
- Officials must use the FBI criminal history record for authorized purposes only and cannot retain or disseminate it in violation of federal statute, regulation or executive order, or rule, procedure or standard established by the National Crime Prevention and Privacy Compact Council.<sup>3</sup>

The FBI has no objection to officials providing a copy of the applicant's FBI criminal history record to the applicant for review and possible challenge when the record was obtained based on positive fingerprint identification. If agency policy permits, this courtesy will save the applicant the time and additional FBI fee to obtain his/her record directly from the FBI by following the procedures found at 28 CFR 16.30 through 16.34. It will also allow the officials to make a more timely determination of the applicant's suitability.

Each agency should establish and document the process/procedures it utilizes for how/when it gives the applicant the FBI Privacy Act Statement, the 28 CFR 50.12 notice, and the opportunity to correct his/her record. Such documentation will assist State and/or FBI auditors during periodic compliance reviews on use of FBI criminal history records for noncriminal justice purposes.
